Met Roseville Police Department's 14th Police Chief — Troy Bergstrom

Roseville residents hit the jackpot. After a nationwide search, city leaders decided to hire one of our own. Continuity of leadership. Nothing wrong with that. Troy Bergstrom, a 26-year police veteran was recently appointed Roseville Police Department's 14th Police Chief. Bergstrom, his wife and two college age sons are residents of West Roseville. He has been described by some as being friendly, approachable and having a great sense of humor. The type of person you want as your neighbor, no less your police chief.

I found him to be every bit of that and more when I sat down with him in his office for this interview. Bergstrom grew up in the San Jose. He started considering police work after his father tragically died during a backpacking trip to Yosemite National Park. He was moved by how compassionate the responding Park Rangers handled the entire incident. Later while a student at Humboldt State University in Arcadia, California he watched while



responding police officers handled another student who was in the midst of a mental health crisis. According to Bergstrom, "They completely calmed him down and took him into custody without incident."

Bergstrom transferred to Sacramento State University and enrolled in the criminal justice program. After several police ride-

longs and careful consideration of other public service careers, he settled on police work and started his career in San Mateo at the age of 22. After several years with San Mateo, he took a lateral transfer to the Roseville Police Department. His wife had family in the area.

Bergstrom is well liked and respected

From City of Roseville Roseville City Council Approves Land Sale for Future Jobs Site

A large regional jobs center is one step closer to reality following Roseville City Council approval for the sale of 6382 Phillip Road to Panattoni Development Company (PDC Sacramento). The future Roseville Industrial Park would allow the city to compete nationally in attracting employers to the area.

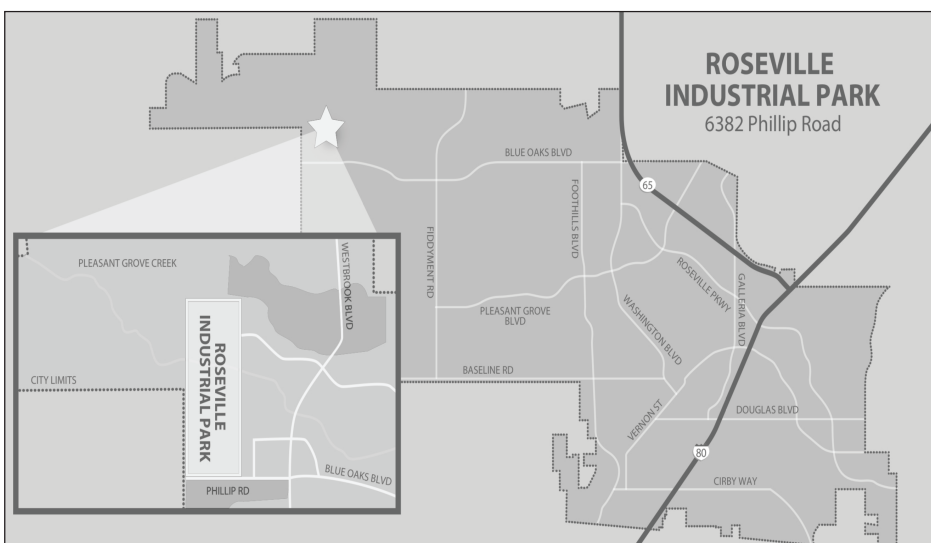
A recent study estimates the potential for \$950 million in annual economic impact and 6,700 jobs when complete.

"This site provides an ideal opportunity to drive significant job growth and economic activity," said City of Roseville Economic Development Director Laura Matteoli. "Roseville has a reputation for offering a combination of lifestyle, educated talent pool and business value, which is attractive for prospective companies."

The approximately 236-acre greenfield parcel, with 191 developable acres, is located

north of a planned six-lane western extension of Blue Oaks Boulevard. The planned six-lane regional Placer Parkway, connecting Highway 65 and 99, bisects the northern part of the property.

As early as 2006, the site was identified for a future industrial park and jobs center.



At that time, city analysis showed potential for a minimum of 18 buildings and 1,080,000 square feet.

"Panattoni has been a long-standing

partner in the City of Roseville. It's vital for our region to continue building industrial manufacturing facilities to create tradable sector jobs. Projects such as this one will be the key to Roseville's economic recovery efforts," Greater Sacramento Economic Council President & CEO Barry Broome said.

The vacant property was declared surplus by City Council on November 20, 2019 and an Exclusive Right to Negotiate with PDC Sacramento was approved on November 18, 2020. In Roseville, the developer has also completed the McKesson and Amazon

properties on Foothills Boulevard.

Future development of the Phillip Road site will require rezoning from public/quasi-public to industrial, a General Plan amendment for industrial use, a major project permit, and environmental review. These entitlements will require consideration by the Planning Commission and City Council.

Industrial trends

A 2020 study by the Greater Sacramento Economic Council showed Roseville's industrial labor market growing faster than the California average since

St. Vincent de Paul & Our Community Combatting Hunger in the COVID Era

Almost nothing is the same as it was pre-2020, but one thing that remains constant is the need to help those facing financial instability and food insecurity in the community around us. The mission of St. Vincent de Paul (SVDP), Roseville is to provide basic human services and programs to prevent hunger and homelessness. We've had to adapt to the challenges and increase in demand that the pandemic has caused, but have managed to continue providing our services thanks to the numerous volunteers (including many from this community) giving their time and talent.

In 2020, SVDP Roseville provided the following:

- An average of 774 households were served each month from our Food Locker, with an estimated total of 218,000 meals worth of food provided last year.
- An average of 85 households had groceries delivered each month via our Bags program for seniors and disabled persons, with an estimated total of 9,180 meals provided.
- An average of 60 guests were served takeout meals daily from our Dining Room, with an estimated total of 12,200 meals served for the year.

Altogether in 2020, with a budget of \$434,000, SVDP Roseville provided goods and services worth \$1,686,000 thanks to our volunteers and community partners.

Current Major Programs and Services:
 Food Locker: Open on Mon., Wed., and Fri. from 9 am until 11 am.

Bags Program: Home delivery of groceries to homebound seniors and disabled persons in Roseville.

Dining Room: Open for takeout 5 days each week for a midday meal.

Homeless Prevention: Assist qualified households with one-time rental and/or utility assistance. Clients receive case management and service collaboration with community partners.

SVDP's ongoing challenge is to fund these programs, which we project will cost 10% more in 2021.

The Big Day of Giving (BDOG)

The BDOG is an annual fund-raising event coordinated by the Sacramento Region Community Foundation for non-profits in the greater Sacramento area. SVDP Roseville's BDOG campaign will run from April 5th through Thursday, May 6th – peaking with a final 24-hour drive of giving!!

SVDP Roseville needs a more-reliable vehicle, and the primary goal of our BDOG campaign is to fund a truck that will pick up donations from local grocery stores and deliver food to the Food Locker, Dining Room, and Bags program. See the insert in your newspaper.

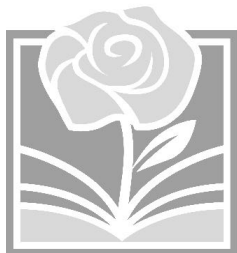
Roseville Joint Union High School District Update *Progress Isn't Always a Straight Line*

These last few weeks have felt encouraging on Roseville Joint Union High School District campuses as we near the part of the pandemic we've all been waiting for: The beginning of the end. While all of our schools will remain in their current operational schedule unless otherwise notified, we are planning for a return to somewhat normal next school year beginning August 11, 2021.

To get us through the end of the school year as seamlessly as possible, we are offering free, voluntary COVID-19 testing at Granite Bay, Roseville and Woodcreek high schools, which are the campuses unable to maintain the four feet distancing guidelines. This means we are able to remain in compliance while monitoring our dwindling case rates and keep schools open and students on campus. Consent forms are available through school sites prior to students receiving COVID-19 testing.

The return of sports to RJUHSD has been an uplifting and necessary activity for the social and emotional health of our athletes and all of the students, coaches and families who support our teams. We now have the ability to play if

we adhere to the appropriate testing guidelines, which means we must test students who reside in a county where the case rate is above 7 per 100,000, students must test more frequently.

We know there are families who will choose to continue virtual learning in the 2021-22 school year, so we will continue to offer a fully-online option through Independence High School (IHS). While RSVL Academy will no longer be in operation, IHS will be able to provide a home school and campus identity along with a robust curriculum pathway for students who choose this option.

RJUHSD is grateful to our community for their part in decreasing case rates and increasing vaccinations that are now allowing us to look towards

a brighter future for our students. Thank you to each staff member, educator, family and student that have helped us to get through this challenging chapter of life together.

Roseville City School District Update *The Year We'll Always Remember*

As I write this article, it is one year to the day that the world as we once knew it changed. What was originally meant to be a two-week break to "flatten the curve," changed our reality in ways we never expected. One year later, the clouds are starting to part and the future is looking brighter each day.

Thanks to a partnership with Placer County Public Health, our educators and staff now have the option to be vaccinated. Pairing this with optional surveillance testing and declining case rates, we are forecasting a 2021-22 school year that may usher in a return to "normal."

But what is "normal," anyway? While the Roseville City School District has implemented a modified traditional schedule of five day a week instruction, we do have plans to offer a full-time, virtual learning school for families next year, pending Board action on April 8. For those families ready to take on a more traditional path next year, we plan to open the school year with full-time, in-person learning August 5, 2021.



Middle school cross country, band classes and choir classes have received the green light to resume activities and we're hopeful that more routine activities will continue to be experienced as our county begins to relax restrictions. So while some of these things aren't business as usual, we're getting closer to a more traditional experience for our students.

We also recognize that the transition back to "normal" may not be so simple for all families, which is why we are here to support you. 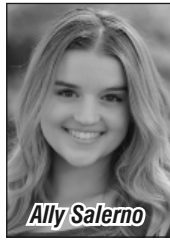

**Safety First —
Between 3,000 to 4,000 People are Killed Annually by Distracted Driving**

A ringing cell phone, fighting kids, or a spilling coffee cup--no one is immune from distractions. When you mix distractions and a vehicle traveling down the road, you get distracted driving. Distracted driving can occur when something diverts your attention from the task of safe and attentive driving. A study by the U.S. Department of Transportation estimates between 3,000 to 4,000 people are killed annually by distracted driving.

According to the Center for Disease Control – Injury Center, there are three primary types of distractions:

Mental or cognitive – when a driver’s mind is focused on something besides driving. These can include talking to another passenger, thinking about something that is upsetting, road rage, daydreaming, or being under the influence of drugs and/or alcohol.

Visual – when a driver looks at something other than what is ahead on the road. These can include looking at your phone, checking and adjusting your GPS, changing the radio station, adjusting your temperature controls, taking in the view, or doing your makeup.

Manual – when one or both hands

are taken off the wheel. These can include eating and drinking, adjusting your child’s seatbelt, smoking, searching through your purse or wallet, or turning knobs in your car.

There are things you can do to ensure you are driving as safely as possible. Here are some simple ways to minimize driving distractions:

- Keep your eyes on the road.
- Pull over to read directions.
- Put your phone in “Do Not Disturb” mode.
- Keep your phone out of reach.
- Make all car adjustments before driving.
- Don’t reach for items while driving.
- Avoid phone calls, even hands-free.
- Stay focused on the road.
- Keep your emotions in check.

Distracted driving is a major cause of car-related injuries. Do your best to stay focused on the task of driving safely and you will be able to respond more quickly, be better positioned to think clearly when needing to respond, and likely spot a distraction before it becomes a problem.

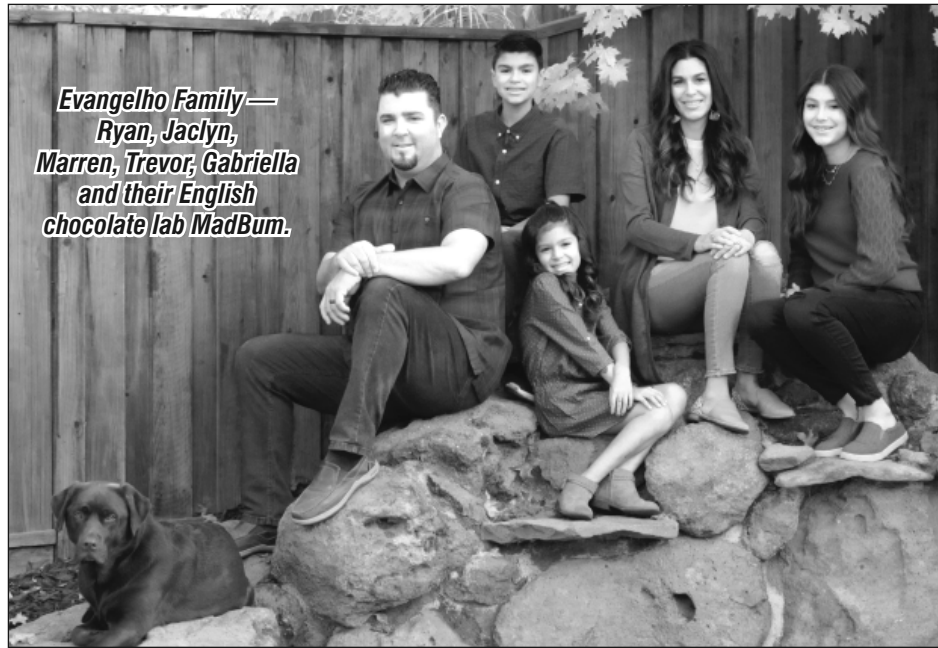

by his officers and many Roseville residents. While a candidate for the chief's job and prior to his appointment, a Roseville officer paid Bergstrom the ultimate compliment a police officer can get from another officer. He was described as a "cop's cop." In police jargon that refers to an officer who is highly respected and regarded by his peers as an officer to emulate. Regarding the community, Mia Winters, a Roseville Westpark area resident and Neighborhood Watch director said, "Chief Bergstrom is responsive, approachable, down-to-earth and a strong community advocate who supports programs like ours."

During his career Bergstrom worked in almost every departmental division and specialized unit, and according to the officer, Bergstrom was not just checking off the boxes on his way to the next promotion but actually immersed himself into every assignment as if it were his last.

Bergstrom told me his two favorite assignments were working in the Crime Suppression Unit and as a patrol sergeant. Bergstrom actually brought the concept of the Crime Suppression Unit to Roseville from his days in San Mateo. The unit is comprised of hard charging detectives, working undercover, pursuing career criminals who commit crimes in Roseville. As a patrol sergeant, he loved working with his team on the graveyard shift.

In 2013, Bergstrom attended the FBI's National Academy, one of the most prestigious

law enforcement executive training programs in the world. While there he exchanged ideas and networked with police executives from all over the country and the world.

Bergstrom explained he started thinking about the chief job as he promoted through the ranks to lieutenant and captain.

As the new Chief, Bergstrom draws from his experience working for 5 different chiefs who set the foundation for the department. He considers every decision he makes from the perspective of how it will affect the community, his officers and the professional support staff. "After all," he said, "my decisions affect the community where my family lives."

Bergstrom believes he inherited a well-functioning police department and plans to improve the department by making incremental positive changes to move the department forward and elevate the good programs to the next level. Another goal is to develop his staff and mentor new leadership.

We talked about several of the innovative programs implemented by the Roseville Police Department. Bergstrom is very proud of the Social Service Unit, the Family Mobile Team and the Mobile Crises Team which deal regularly with the homeless and those people experiencing mental health issues. Roseville was forward thinking and ahead of many other police departments when they formed these teams. The teams have trained social workers and crisis counselors responding to assist officers with a myriad of mental health and social problems.

Roseville also has a number of Placer

County Probation Officers assigned to the work out of the police department. Probation officers and police officers working together is a force multiplier and enhances the exchange of information and intelligence. This partnership is a win for both departments and the community.

Another program totally unique to Roseville is the Interfaith Task Force which is run by volunteer Al Moody. The program brings together security personnel from 25 to 30 different churches in south Placer County to exchange information about problems facing their respective places of worship. Those problems range from graffiti and thefts to mentally ill persons disrupting services. The task force gives security personnel the opportunity to exchange information, network and discuss best practices.

Bergstrom is especially proud of the community Neighborhood Watch Programs which meet regularly at the police department to exchange information. The neighborhood watch programs act as the eyes and ears of the police department. As Bergstrom says, "It is simply neighbors looking out for each other and calling the police when something looks suspicious."

Community relations are important to Bergstrom and the Roseville Police Department. He and his officers regularly attend neighborhood and community meetings. In fact, almost two thirds of the officers actually live in Roseville. They are our neighbors and, therefore, are personally invested in keeping our communities safe.

When asked about motivating his officers in a time when recent laws were passed in California weakening the criminal justice system, Bergstrom reminds his officers not to stress over something they have no control over and to continue doing good solid police work. Even in light of the anti-police sentiment in some areas of the country, Bergstrom said he would not discourage any young person from going into police work especially in Roseville which has an unusually high degree of community support. In fact, one of his sons is considering police work. Bergstrom sums up police work as driving into neighborhoods, talking to people and keeping people safe. That aspect of police work will never change.

Bergstrom has submitted a budget proposal to purchase body worn cameras for his officers. Bergstrom believes the cameras will provide an extra level of safety for his officers, enhance evidence collection and improve transparency with the community.

In his leisure time, Bergstrom likes to travel with his family. They enjoy visiting national parks, hiking and are sports fans. Bergstrom likes to ski and is a voracious reader. He has read all of the Tom Clancy books and enjoys political memoirs.

I sense Troy Bergstrom is the same guy whether he is at home or at work. He is a man of character, an experienced lawman and cares deeply about the community he lives and works in. We are fortunate to have Troy Bergstrom as our police chief and as our neighbor.

Astronomical Events for April

April 8/9/15/16: Earthshine Nights: The Waxing and Waning Crescent Moon phases in April and May are the best time to see earthshine, where the unlit part of the Moon becomes visible. It is also known as Da Vinci glow.

Little-known to most, one of Leonardo's finest works is not a painting or an invention, but rather something from astronomy: He

solved the ancient riddle of Earthshine. You can see Earthshine whenever there is a crescent Moon on the horizon at sunset. Look between the horns of the crescent for a ghostly image of the full Moon. That's Earthshine.

April 12: New Moon: Take advantage of a dark night sky to see the planets. The three morning planets are Jupiter, Saturn, and Mars. The latter two worlds are snuggled close together as April begins, then as the month progresses, they all will gradually stretch out, becoming equally spaced apart on April 9.

April 22/23: Lyrid Meteor Shower: The Lyrid meteor shower is expected to peak around April 22 and 23, in the Southwestern area of the sky. Named after constellation Lyra, the Lyrids are one of the oldest recorded meteor showers—according to some historical Chinese texts, the shower was seen over 2,500 years ago. The fireballs in the meteor shower are created by debris from comet Thatcher, which takes about 415 years to orbit around the Sun. The comet is expected to be visible from Earth again in 2276.

April 27: Super Moon/Pink Moon: April's Full Moon is traditionally known as the Pink Full Moon. This year, it's also a Super Moon, so it will look a little larger than a usual Full Moon. The name Pink Moon comes from one of the first spring flowers, Wild Ground Phlox, also known as Moss Phlox, as they cover the ground like a pink blanket. These brightly colored flowers are native to North America, and they often bloom around the time of April's Full Moon.
