What to Expect

Project Components

Project components include:

- new curb, gutter and sidewalks;
- upgraded and improved one-way alleys;
- new asphalt on roadway;
- significant utility upgrades
- colorful trees and landscaping;
- architectural features at both ends of the project area;



improved traffic flow;

- diagonal parking on side streets; and
- a modified intersection

at Riverside, Douglas, and Vernon.

Construction Phasing

Work will be performed in small sections along Riverside and the alleyways to reduce the impact. Although access to your home or business will be maintained, at some point, construction will occur near your lot.



Staying Informed

The goal is to limit surprises. Information will be provided during construction to inform you of schedules, impacts, detours, etc.

After Hours Contact Information

In the unlikely event that something occurs after normal business hours, you will be asked to designate someone from your site to be contacted. This is not mandatory but it is highly recommended.

Changes

Design Modifications

The final Riverside plans do not include a roundabout at the Vernon/Riverside intersection. Additionally, the utility lines in the alleyways will remain above ground.

Although this is a departure from the initial design, these changes were made to improve the project. The consensus of the project engineers is that the revised intersection will significantly improve traffic flow and that overhead electrical lines better meet the area's development needs.

Finally, the cost savings will be redirected into additional project area visual improvements. There are changes, but the end result is an improved design that is ready to bid.

Things to Consider

Taking Advantage

There were businesses on Vernon Street that were more successful during their streetscape project than at any time before. Remember, construction crews are potential customers. In addition, there will be a lot of focus on Riverside Avenue during this project; use this as an opportunity to find a new tenant or pursue your own project. The Redevelopment Agency is prepared to assist in either event.

Maintaining Access

You understand your operation and your property better than anyone else. Considering that portions of the street and the alley will be unavailable from time to time, think about how this might impact access to your business. Let's discuss these issues and develop solutions before they impact you.

Keeping Your Customers Informed

Every effort will be made to keep you informed so that you have time to react to the construction process. You might want to consider how to inform your customers and partners in order to



limit the impact to their schedules.

Adjusting To Impacts

Consider:

- revising hours,
- adding or reducing staff, or
- altering deliveries, etc.

Don't assume things will be slower; some businesses benefit from construction projects. Have a plan in place for any event.

Staying Involved
